RULES AND REGULATIONS.

National Rules to govern except as herein provided, to-wit: If the judges ascertain from any source that a race has been fixed for any horse to win, it shall be considered fraud and they shall have the right to change drivers, and in case of refusal of owners to consent to this, the horse will be sent to barn and entrance money forfeited.
